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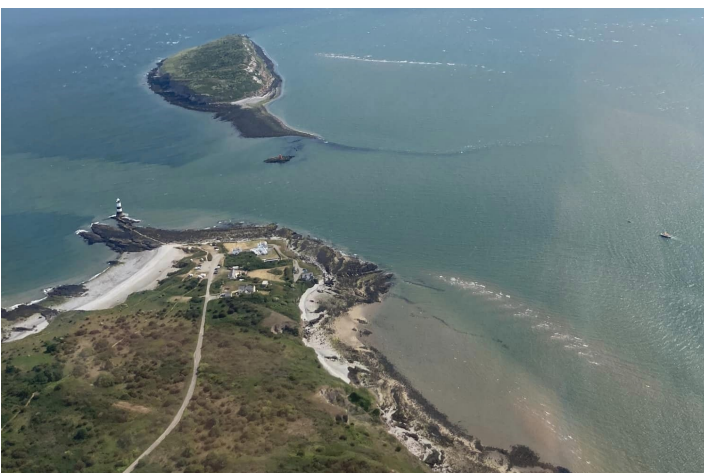


# Bryn flies again

I'm going to share with you this month my memories of a very special day out on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> June. The trip was a combined Christmas and birthday gift from Anwen – a helicopter trip around Anglesey and a once in a lifetime treat.

Having walked the whole of the coastal path I was looking forward to doing it without breaking into a sweat, with glorious views and of course with good company. When walking solo, one tends to focus on the start point, finish point, the weather, finding the path, comfort breaks, footcare, etc and one does not really have a chance to relax. Hard work, I tell you, but a lot of thinking time which is good. The best therapy ever.

Having arrived at Caernarfon Airport, we were introduced to Dan our pilot. We had met before, so we knew we were in good hands and after making sure the doors were properly locked and the intercom working we were up. I would recommend this form of transport to anyone – providing you have a good pilot of course. Within seconds off the ground you are floating backwards and then thrust forward gently and up to the safe height and enjoying the view from your glass bubble.



Within minutes we were over Ynys Llanddwyn, its glorious beach and headland – and the Church of Santes Dwynwen. This is the Welsh St Valentine's day, celebrated on the 25<sup>th</sup> January. Being a true Celt I celebrate the Welsh one of course – roses are much cheaper then than they are on 14<sup>th</sup> February!

I will not dwell on the story of Dwynwen – please do take time to read about the best love story in Wales.

Had we flown over the next house in 2011 we would have probably been shot down – the house on Bodorgan Home Farm where William and Kate stayed during his work at RAF Valley. It's fairly remote and has access to its own private beach. The Bodorgan Estate, which covers 14,000 acres, has existed since 1599 and is still in the same family. It is the home of Sir George Meyrick and his wife Lady Candida Tapps Gervis Meyrick. I wonder how does Sir George address his good wife?

Over Tŷ Croes race track next but there was no action there today. Dan then pointed out Ynys Cwyfan – the Church in the Sea, and Craig y Môr at Trearddur Bay, which was used for filming the ITV Series *The Safe House* in 2016. Funny, since I was quite a fan of *The Safe House* and the unmarked police cars travelling at high speed over moorlands and wilderness to reach *The Safe House* with witnesses that needed protecting. It never occurred to me that it was in Anglesey. Apparently most of the shots were in Scotland, they only filmed the cars arriving in Anglesey and carefully ensured that the sea was out of the shot!

Then over the highest point on Ynys Môn – Holyhead Mountain, and I would urge you to go to Holyhead. The Holyhead Breakwater Country Park is there with café and facilities and while you're there, look down at the Holyhead Breakwater (the squiggle going out to sea in the photo). Anwen and I have walked this in the past – it's the longest breakwater in the UK, being 1.7 miles long.

I would encourage you to read more about this Victorian feat of engineering – every stone was dug out of Holyhead mountain, dressed by hand in a shed and put on a flat wagon on a railway track and wheeled onto the site. They were then placed in situ by divers in Victorian diving suits and helmets, working between the tides – the mind

boggles. It is still there today, open to pedestrians only and Stenna have been successful in securing £12m lottery grant to refurbish this magnificent structure.

Anyway, must move on. We moved inland a bit over Mynydd Parys, which in the 18<sup>th</sup> century was the largest copper mine in the world. The remains of the mining work has left what can only be described as a lunar landscape. It was the copper from here that covered the hulls of the battleships at Trafalgar 1805. We have visited before and intend to return. It's well worth a visit – and there is no charge!

We were soon over the former 200 acre Rhosgoch Oil Refinery, once owned by Shell, with the circular bases of the tanks to be seen clearly from the air. There was an option put forward by the present owners, Conygar, to build a village here for the hundreds of workers that would be required to build Wylfa Newydd. When Hitachi pulled out, that option bit the dust. They are now looking at the site as a possible renewable energy site.

And as we spoke, we were flying over Porth Wen solar project. This is a 190 acre solar farm commissioned this year and capable of meeting the electricity demand of up to 9,500 houses and a truly impressive sight from above.

Back to the coast and a flight over Moelfre. It looked beautiful today, however many, many lives have been lost along this coast as the numerous information boards along the path point out. The most famous, of course, being the *Royal Charter* returning home from

Melbourne to Liverpool October 1859 with 371 passengers and 112 crew on board. Many of the passengers were gold miners who had struck it rich in Australia and were so, so close to home.

They had large amounts of gold about their persons and the Royal Charter was also carrying a consignment of gold. It was claimed by the very few survivors – 33 of the 483 on board – that the captain had been advised to pull into Holyhead harbour for shelter but decided to continue on his journey!

It was at this point that we encountered a most spectacular view up the steep Llanberis Pass with both Llyn Padarn and Llyn Peris crystal clear and Castell Dolbadarn standing proudly between them. Now that is something neither of us will ever forget.



Another spectacular view – the Menai Straits from the air with Pwll Ceris, or The Swellies in English, looking more menacing than ever from up here. No wonder Nelson trained his hand- picked crew here: *'If they can sail The Swellies they can sail anywhere in the world'*, he is reputed to have said. Looking from above I can well believe it – the rocks looked very treacherous!

We were soon back in Dinas Dinlle and Dan dropped us very gently back on the tarmac – that's what I call a proper day out!

# Spotlight on ... Anwen Davies

I was born (literally!) and bred in Ystalyfera, a village some 12 miles from Swansea. School days at the local junior and comprehensive schools were enjoyable, and then off I went to Bangor University. And that was the beginning of my emigration to the North, more or less!

My first post was secretary to two BBC news reporters in Bangor, and then production assistant at the HTV television studio in Mold. I got to travel with this job. In 1982, I spent six weeks on the continent filming a series of six travel programmes, presented by Elinor Jones. Five years later, I had seven weeks working in Bangkok, New Zealand and Australia.

A period followed of raising a family, typesetting local Welsh-language magazines, and working as a translator for Flintshire County Council and Ysgol Glan Clwyd, St Asaph.

A big change came with the family becoming more independent – I was appointed editorial officer with the Welsh Joint Education Committee in Cardiff. I really enjoyed the work and company of my colleagues, but travelling to Cardiff every week was very tiring, and so I reluctantly refused the offer to extend the two-year contract.

From a ridiculously long commute to a very short one – I became an editorial officer for the Welsh Books Council, working from home, mainly on the Reading Well booklists. These books help to understand and manage health and wellbeing using helpful reading.

## ***What are your plans for the future?***

I have now given up working – I shan't say 'retired', that sounds too final. Perhaps I'll edit the occasional book. Rhiannon, my 16-month-old granddaughter now has priority, and we spend three days in each other's company. This, and compositing *Llais Llandyrnog Voice*



almost every month, is more than enough for the time being. And helping with coffee mornings, of course. Setting up the village hall for a coffee morning is hard work, but seeing the enjoyment of people socialising makes it all worthwhile. The generosity of the donations to various charities causes never ceases to amaze me.

## ***What are you favourite three places?***

Llangwyfan – I enjoy the walk up the hill and past the church; and Mumbles, near Swansea and Tenby – fantastic holiday locations.

## ***Who would you invite to dine with you, dead or alive?***

We're only here once, and you've got to have a laugh, haven't you? So Tudur Owen (Welsh-language comedian), Dave Allen, and the two Ronnies. Victor Borge at the piano would be good fun as well.

## The Wright life

Despite being holiday time, the garden is still a busy place. Everything is growing and the garden can look a wee bit out of control – well mine does. The heavy thundery downpours we had earlier in the summer have beaten a lot of my wildflower area down, so I've been selective weeding – leaving anything of interest and removing nettles, docks and things which look rather 'weedy'.

The saying 'Best laid plans of mice and men....' is very appropriate. Do you remember last year I decided to stop growing potatoes? Well, that plan has changed. In the spring, I planted my winter beetroot in the main vegetable patch; these feed my hens during the winter as treats and something to peck at. They were growing well despite the hot dry conditions and I was very pleased. However, one afternoon a breakaway gang of naughty hens must have discovered a hole in my defences and the fresh sweet plants on the other side. Within a few hours they had devoured the lot! By the time I returned home the whole row had completely disappeared with no trace. Time for a re-think. No more tasty beetroot for the hens, replaced with spuds for me to be harvested at Christmas. I haven't grown these before, so am waiting to see if they are successful and I'm anticipating tucking into tasty new potatoes with my turkey dinner.

The seed merchants send the tubers in July/August and I have just planted mine – Charlotte and Maris Peer. They have been held back in cold storage and don't need to be 'chitted' and must be planted immediately. Planting them now will ensure they are far enough ahead and established before the first frosts – well, that's the plan. I have planted them on the west facing side of the vegetable garden with the benefit of any sun.

August is the start of harvest time and the

greenhouse is abundant with tomatoes, chillis and cucumbers. With the hot and dry weather earlier in the year my tomatoes haven't produced a good crop and it's uncertain I will have any top-quality ones for the village show at the end of the month. I always try and enter something and if the girls are laying, then I will put a few eggs in. This year I have some fantastic hollyhocks grown from some 'out of date' seeds a friend gave me – the motto of the story is never throw seeds away. Shame that they will be finished before the show as they are spectacular.



Have you spotted more ants this year? I've had them under the concrete slabs in the greenhouse. I noticed my dogs, who love to sit in there, were reluctant to go in and I saw loads of flying ants. I caught sight of them crossing my yard in a procession when I was recently painting my front gate. All marching from one side to the other in a snaking line in single file. It must be like crossing a large desert for them. Sometimes if I find a nest, I put a biscuit tin over the entrance in the morning and as the day warms up the ants will carry their eggs up into the container; later in the day I slide a piece of card under as the container will be full of eggs. They make a tasty treat for wild birds and my hens love them. No doubt, it is a delicious time for all – busy – but with lots of yummy treats to enjoy!

They distributed a home Security pack issued by North Wales Police, which included top tips for home security; a sticker for display outside the house, details of [www.immobilise.com](http://www.immobilise.com), the website where you can register your property for free, e.g. laptops and tablets, and a UV pen to write your postcode on valuables.

The top tips are:

- ✎ Lock all doors and close all windows before leaving the house.
- ✎ Lock front and back doors, even when you are in the house and particularly overnight.
- ✎ Don't leave valuable items on view. Don't leave car keys near to a letter box where a burglar can reach through and steal them.
- ✎ Lock garden gates and side entrances. Don't leave anything lying about that a burglar could use to break in to your home.
- ✎ Don't leave wheelie bins where they could

be used by someone to climb over a wall or fence.

- ✎ Mark your belongings with a UV pen.
- ✎ Make sure your home looks occupied. Use timer switches for lights and noise from a radio.
- ✎ Consider installing a burglar alarm and outside security lighting.
- ✎ Be vigilant; report any unusual activity, people or Vehicles in your area to the police, giving as much information as possible.

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# Llandyrnog W.I.

The WI met on the 04/07/23 at the Cocoa Rooms. Since we last met we had an update that the WI cake stall at the Horse Show, which went very well and raised £68 and that all members who went on the trip to Bodnant had a lovely time.

The next informal trip was to The British Ironwork Centre, Oswestry.



Sue Wright, senior associate for 'Book of You' came and spoke to us about being a dementia friend and about the reminiscence books they create for individuals and groups using photos, videos and voice recordings. We looked at some on-line, and they were excellent e.g. one about the Mold – Denbigh Railway which sparked a lot of reminiscences.

We played a game and learned that there are over one hundred types of dementia and that it is a disease of the brain which is not a natural part of aging and can include sensory and sequencing issues as well as personality changes over time. Sue used an analogy of the rational brain being Ikea shelves which wobble, and the top books fall off first – hence the retaining of the longer established memories down below. We also have a feeling bookcase which is much more solid and so emotions and feelings remain strong even with dementia. We all reminisced about childhood sweets, and it

got us all smiling and remembering great memories. This is important for people living with dementia (they do not say sufferers any more as it highlights the negatives connotations).

An island off the coast of North Wales has become the first dark sky sanctuary in Europe, meaning there is hardly any light pollution on island.

Having one of the best night skies in the world for spotting stars, Ynys Enlli (*Bardsey Island*) has now been given special status and awarded International Dark Sanctuary certification.

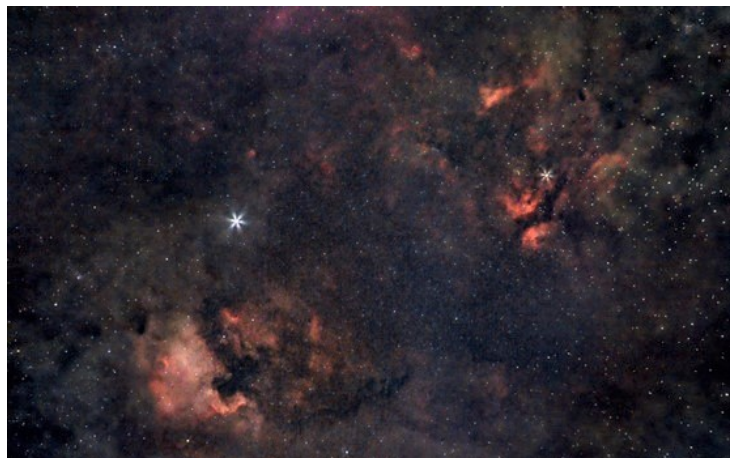
There are only 16 other sites in the world recognised as the most remote and dark places on Earth, and has been given this award by the International Dark Sky Association (IDA). Safeguarding such a valuable resource as a dark sky will benefit people, plants, and wildlife.

As Chris Jones, chair of Llandyrnog Astronomical Society says:

"Last month, Diana and I visited Ynys Enlli to see the Night Skies. It was a fantastic journey and we're hoping to go back soon. I hope this new status will raise Ynys Enlli's profile and establish Wales as an 'International Dark Sky Country'!

# Recipe

- ♦ Unfortunately, the community policeman was unable to be present and the Clerk was going to ask for an update regarding the recent attempted break-in and subsequent break-ins around the village.
- ♦ DCC has provided an update on the progress with the road safety measures around the village but no specific dates as to when the speed monitoring unit will be placed.
- ♦ A new bin has been placed in Maes Clwyd following the damage caused by an agricultural contractor who has been billed for the work.
- ♦ The Annual Audit Return has been completed and returned to Audit Wales.
- ♦ The Community Council was asked to comment on two planning applications forwarded to them by the Planning Authority:
  - ♦ Five rotunda houses on land to rear of Kinmel Arms – unable to support
  - ♦ Erection of agricultural shed at Cwm Hyfryd – unable to support.
- ♦ It was reported that the directors of the community shop were still awaiting the outcome of their bid for additional funding from the Welsh Government.
- ♦ DCC had confirmed that it will deal with the Japanese Knotweed found in the Llangwyfan area appropriately at the right time of the year for treatment.
- ♦ It is hoped that Procter Johnson administration staff will relocate from Flint to the former Arla site in the very near future with production starting the first quarter of 2024, if not sooner – depending on equipment supply chain issues.
- ♦ The Community Council would like to wish David Weyman a full and speedy recovery.

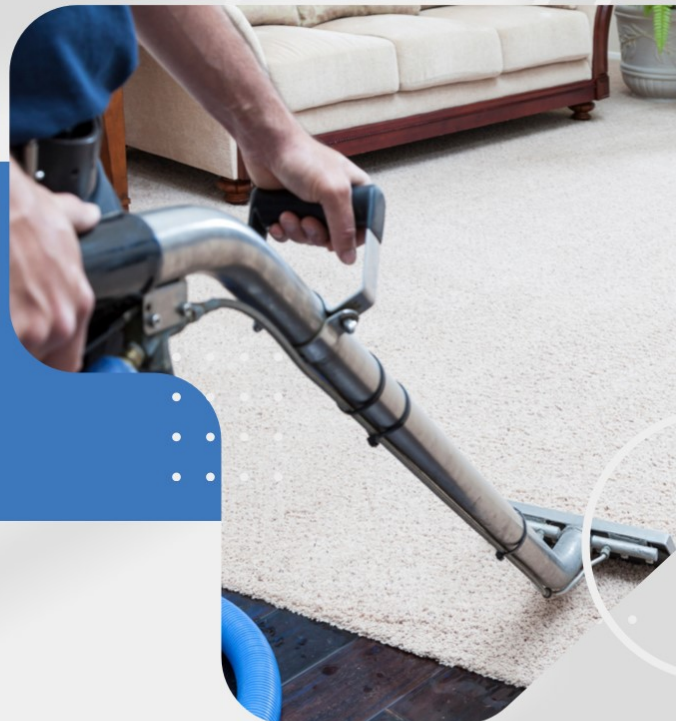
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
