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The Wright life

At last, it's warm enough, so no more winter rugs for Bob – yippee. On a lovely sunny morning I like to turn him out 'naked'; he loves to roll and it helps to dislodge the old winter coat. Patches of white hair appear in the field where he has had a good roll over and over. There is an old saying that a horse is worth a hundred pounds for every time it can roll right over. It is also a sign of a healthy horse with no stiffness as they need to be athletic and supple to roll completely over. To help get the hair out I use a comb to gently remove the hair. It comes out in bundles which I leave to blow away. I have seen birds gathering it up in their beaks for nesting material. It's a lovely thought that Bob's hair has lined a nest somewhere and the chicks are toasty warm. Nature's way of recycling, I suppose.

Birds use all sorts of 'stuff' as nesting material including sheep wool, twigs, moss and feathers, but I have also seen nests with plastic, string and discarded manmade items. Birds build a multitude of different nests, from simple hollows in the ground to carefully engineered structures. The size is correlated to the bird's proportion and clutch. Every bird has its own architectural style, from tight balls of intertwined twigs to the moss-lined nest of a long-tailed tit and even the miniscule nest of the wren with the entrance hole less than 2.5 cm in diameter. She loves to build her nest by the midden within the tight ivy that grows along the fence. However, the most engineered, in my view, is the swallow. They stick tiny globules of mud together to create a bowl which hangs from the beams in the stable and even have built a nest on top of the light fitting. These nests are like concrete and some have been used for many years – with the swallows returning to the same nests year after year. I was glad to see the return of the swallows on 12th April. I suddenly noticed two swooping and darting up and down over the house and



flying in and out of the stable, sussing it out.

It is a sure sign that summer is on its way. I have also noticed a robin adapting an old swallow's nest in the safety of the stairwell – she has added her own chosen nesting material between the nest and wooden floor above. It's a safer place away from the buzzard, magpie and carrion crow who cannot reach her. I've not seen where the pied wagtails are nesting yet, it always seems to be in an odd place – in a skip, on the stairs to the hay barn, never a normal place.

The red kites have been flying high above the house, they are easily identified with their forked tail silhouetted against the blue sky. The red-legged partridges have returned for another year to nest in the long grass in the garden. They build a scrape in the ground which is tucked under the hedge and if you look closely, she is currently sitting tight on approximately 15 tiny eggs. Fingers crossed they survive.

A member of the public asked if it was still possible to buy community shares. It is, and we will open up a quick link from our website to make this easy. Shareholders were reminded to let us know if there are any changes in their contact details or if they had purchased shares on behalf of a child to let us know when they attain 16 and gain voting rights.

March the Month for prostate cancer was something I did consider last year and when the chance to enrol for it came up this year I decided to give it a go. March the Month is a 11,000 steps-a-day challenge representing the 11K men that prostate cancer kills every year in the UK.

Having enrolled with Prostate Cancer UK, they set me up with a JustGiving page and off I went from the 1st March. I set myself a target of £250 and spread the word about my challenge and chosen charity through my social network channels. It's surprising how many steps I do in a normal working day but if I needed to top them up, I would head out in the dark March evenings with my torch and high viz. At weekends I would make the most of the fantastic walks and views in and around Llandyrnog and up to the Clwydian Range.

My final total while writing this is £2,155 which is amazing. Most of the funding came in through the JustGiving page but I also got some very generous cash donations given to me and I added them to my page.

I would like to thank everyone for their support and generosity but mostly my challenge was to create awareness of this horrible disease. Generally, men are not very good about going to see the doctor, especially if it's a bit of a delicate issue. So please, boys, don't leave any problems you might have unchecked – go and see your doctor as soon as you notice a problem, whatever it is.

Over the garden fence

I'm not going to mention the weather, but just to say that I have been in the garden today since it's dried a little and not rained. I'm writing this on 19 April and I haven't planted anything in the vegetable garden yet! But there we go, we can't do anything about the weather, can we?



We really like peas and beans and I try to ensure that there are enough in the freezer to keep us going over Christmas, at least. I usually start them in small plastic cells 1 inch square, with one bean (edgewise) and three peas to each one. In a few weeks, they are about 3 inches high with a good root. By starting them in this way, I find that they do well and birds leave them alone. Then I plant them out in a hole made by pressing a spade handle roughly an inch and a half into the soil, and just dropping the seeds into it.

I plant beans some 3 inches apart in a domino shape, i.e. four plants in a square and one in the middle. The three pea plants from the cell are planted together, in a double row, around 4 inches from each other. *Early Onward* is a good variety to plant early and then *Onward* later on. Usually, I plant beans in November around Guy Fawkes' Day to have an early crop in the spring, again starting them in cells and planting them out as usual. They can stand the winter quite well and give a very early crop. You can be eating these long before those planted in Spring are fully grown. The best variety to sow in November is *Aquadulse Claudia*. *De Monica* is an early one to plant in the spring and then I like Bunyard's Exhibition.

I place small poles every 5 feet or so each side of the row of peas and beans, and tie bale twine from pole to pole 10 inches or so above ground. I find that this makes it easier to keep them up and harvest them. I really enjoy walking between the rows, eating the peas and beans raw.

The cells are also ideal for onions and beetroot. I try to plant the onions in January, four or five seeds to each cell, and planting them out as a cell. They grow slowly in a cluster in each other's company (I believe). *Santero F1* grow well for me. They don't grow too large and keep well through the winter. Beetroots also do well in a cluster, they don't need thinning out, so there's no waste. *Boltardy* is a good variety – I've tried others, but I always to back to my favourite.

I really hope that the weather improves – I don't think that we'll catch up this year, but plants keep on growing and pleasantly surprising us.



- Look out for your UK government email to validate your voucher




Messy Church

Tuesday Club

The guest speaker in the April meeting of the Tuesday Club was Gwen Davies of Vale Vineyard, the first grape farmers in the Vale of Clwyd. Gwen and her husband, Rhys, have established a thriving vineyard on the lower



slopes of the Clwydian Range, between Llandyrnog and Bodfari. It was quite a venture, but the micro climate and quality agricultural land combine to make an excellent location.

8000 vines grow there and a lot of hard work is involved in preparing the vines to give the best crop. Harvest days involve family and



friends to pick the grapes by hand.

Vale Vineyard has won many awards already with the Vale Solaris – a still white wine, the Vale Rondo – still rosé wine, and the Vale début sparkling rosé. Gwen now runs the day to day management of the vines and business and has developed a guided tour of the vineyard, which includes tasting four of its wines and a cheese platter in the restored barn or on the patio with marvellous views across the Vale of Clwyd. The cellar door is also open occasionally to sell wine – check the website: valevineyard.co.uk and Facebook page for details.

March was a special month for Gwen and Rhys – attending a reception at 10 Downing Street which celebrated community food and farming champions (although they did not meet Rishi Sunak!), and the first Welsh wine showcase in London.

Gwen was thanked for her very interesting talk, and light refreshments were served. The raffle was drawn and the members reminded that the next meeting will be on Wednesday, 15 May. New members are always welcome – a warm welcome awaits!

A message from the Priest

A word to say for the month of May

This time three years ago, we had seen society begin to move around again at what seemed like a quick rate following the lengthy winter lockdown we had all endured. Of course for some of us it hadn't gone quick enough, especially those with family living in different parts of Wales for whom the month of May brought about the welcome relaxation of bubbles being permitted within households once again. For many, May 2021 was a special month of being reunited with loved ones.

In the previous month that year, after a rigorous vetting and challenging interview process, I had been on a transition course to qualify as a chaplain in the British Army and commissioned to be a Padre in the reserves. One of the main purposes of a Padre is to serve the needs of soldiers in the British army in the unit where we are placed. One of the major needs which is obviously prevalent in a military context comes about from soldiers on operations for long periods and the families and soldiers missing each other. Of course, it is their job but essentially military personnel do this for our sake, a self-sacrifice for the good of others. Whatever your opinion of which wars we engage with as a nation, without some kind of protection and security personnel, we would become vulnerable and taken advantage of, one way or another.

Many of us had gone a long time with the pandemic restrictions living without real life contact with people we love and as a result we couldn't help but realise and begin to measure from grace brought about by the absence where we have, too often, taken close relationships and even everyday encounters with people for granted.

There is a well-known parable which Jesus tells that shares the story of when we spend time away from God, in the way that many of us were separated from our loved ones during coronavirus and increasingly more military personnel in today's climate are separated

from theirs as many tensions mount! No matter how far we go, the parable of the prodigal son teaches, no matter how much we go wrong and squander the goodness gifted to us, God is always there waiting for us, with arms open wide. His love is so complete that he will not only welcome us with open arms, he will put on a ginormous, lavish banquet and affirm us in our worthiness with great joy and complete forgiveness. Perhaps you'd like to read the scripture as a reflection to help you have this conversation of separation and return, to reflect on how we have gone back to taking others for granted as though coronavirus never happened, have unhealthy attitudes towards others too often for too long and to feel something more of the love of God for you. It can be found in the bible in the book of Luke, Chapter 15, verses 11–32.

I hope you have a joyful month of May 2024. Do join us at St Dyfnog's church Llanrhaeadr where there is a communion service each Wednesday at 10:30am or each Sunday morning for a service starting at 11:15am in either St Dyfnog's, St Tyrnog's, Llandyrnog or many other options across the mission area. These are available to see on the Mission area newsletter in either of these two churches porches each month. It is in these gatherings that all continue to learn to grow in graciousness and love for the other. In a world filled with too much tension, I highly recommend the peace and goodness freely given.

- The new screen and camera have been fitted and thanks to go John McGuire for enabling this work – we will now be able to have hybrid meetings. A request has been made for a film club using the new equipment. The Community Council are in favour of the principle, providing evidence is available of the support before purchasing the licence and equipment to enable this to happen.
- A motorcyclist had unfortunately come off his motorbike as a direct result of hitting the mud and debris on the road by Cross Keys on April 6th – luckily the person was relatively unhurt. The Community Council is to put pressure on the County Council to get to the root of this problem of excessive surface water runoff. This water had also caused sub-floor flooding to Tŷ Capel Dyffryn.
- The managing director of Procter Johnson has agreed to raise the D-Day commemorative flag on the site of the former creamery as we head towards 6th June.
- It was decided to donate £100 to the WI to buy bedding plants – members of the WI are going to work in conjunction with homeowners and 'adopt' some hanging baskets around the village to brighten the place up. It was also decided to purchase two planters for either side of the bench at Celynog crossroads to make it more balanced and remove the timber one.
- A meeting was held on 18th April at the Cocoa Rooms with Mr Shuker who advised how to access funds for better heating and insulation.

- Cllr Williams and McGuire reported on a One Voice Wales meeting they had recently attended.
- An approach had been made to the school suggesting the Community Council could supply it with a flagpole to commemorate the numerous official days. They would be delighted and will be a real educational aid and an asset – to be discussed at a future meeting.
- A drop in session on the new bin collection is to be held at Caledfryn on 24th April – the Community Council has asked for Denbighshire CC's policy re unadopted roads but no response has been received. It is believed, however, that individual householders affected would have received a letter explaining what is expected of them.
- An amendment to the application for a replacement dwelling has been received and was discussed. Although the access was an improvement on the previous application, the Community Council's views regarding whether or not the amendment to the overall size of the dwelling was 'minor' was subjective. It is a matter for the Case Officer to decide whether or not it is in line with the technical advice note regarding replacement dwellings.
- There were concerns about water ponding by Maes y Wern and also the surface water runoff around Glan y Wern Isa/the sewage treatment plant and the concerns will be relayed to the relevant authorities.
 Although the Community Council appreciates the restraint on the local authority, councillors feel a responsibility to raise such matters.

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
